Rock Legends The Coasters Perform At SFSC Monday

The national anniversary tour of "Smokey Joe's Café: The Songs of Leiber & Stoller" is coming to South Florida State College's Theatre for the Performing Arts on Monday as part of the 2014-15 SFSC Artist Series.

Smokey Joe's is directed by Tony Award nominee Chet Walker and features the Rock 'n Roll Hall of Fame group, The Coasters

It is a tribute to legendary songwriters Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller, who ushered in the era of rock 'n roll by penning numerous songs that rose to Billboard charts in the late 1950s and early 1960s. Stylistically, their songs ranged from humorous high-energy

tunes to more somber ballads – all grounded in rhythm and blues. As lyricists, the team became known for their story-telling ability and wit, as well as their depictions of teenage life during the era.

"Smokey Joe's Café" features 38 songs made famous by rock 'n roll pioneers like The Drifters and Elvis Presley. Show songs include "On Broadway," "Fools Fall in Love," and the show stopping "Jailhouse Rock."

"Smokey Joe's Gafé" made its Broadway debut on March 2, 1995, at the Virginia Theatre. During the show's milestone run of four years and 1! months, the production became Broadway's longest-running musical revue, playing 2,036 performances.

The musical's soundtrack recording won a Grammy Award in 1996.

The Coasters recorded over 20 Leiber and Stoller songs including "Poison Ivy," "Yakety Yak," "Love Potion No. 9" and the ever-popular "Charley Brown." They were inducted into the Rock 'n Roll Hall of Fame in 1987, fittingly alongside Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller.

New law impacts some SFSC students

Tuition residency changes benefit veterans, undocumented students

AVON PARK - The significant difference between paying in-state and out-of-state college tuition can impact a student's decision to pursue higher education.

But House Bill 851, which became law July 1, has helped some students meet the eligibility to pay lower in-

state tuition fees.

South Florida State College Dean of Student Services Timothy Wise said House Bill 851 has affected more than a dozen students at South Florida State College.

Two students who are undocumented residents qualified for instate tuition, and about 10 veterans

benefited from the law.

Wise explained how the law helps veterans pursuing higher education: If someone in the military was discharged from a base in Georgia, he or she may write down "Georgia" as their state of residency, but if he moved to Florida, he would not be considered a Fiorida resident when enrolling in a college or university.

Many veterans don't know what state they are going to settle in, so they just write down wherever they were discharged, he said, and this was happening all over the country.

House Bill 851 fixed that set of circumstances for the veterans, Wise

said.

It also helped undocumented students who had three years in a Florida school system and graduated from a Florida high school qualify for the much-lower Florida resident tuition rates. When they graduated from high

school, they didn't have to prove they were U.S. citizens, Wise said.

There are some areas of the state where this has had a big impact such as Miami and Tampa, he said.

'The larger cities, I think, have been able to open the doors to this broader spectrum and provide educational opportunity for folks," Wise said. "Prior to House Bill 851 those students weren't coming to state schools. I am unsure of whether they were going to private schools or not, but a lot of them just weren't getting any education beyond high school.

. . .

There is a "huge difference" between in-state and out-of-state tuition, Wise said. In-state tuition is about \$1,200 to \$1,500 per semester. while out-of-state tuition is about \$4,500.

"It took a while for folks to understand that our rules had to be adjusted and only the state can adjust residency rules; we are not allowed to make up our own," Wise noted.

From a public policy standpoint, "the more educated your populace is, the better," he said. "I think that was the underlying sense behind it. House Bill 851 was trying to create a more educated populace here, and better economic development for the individual and the community.'

SFSC President Thomas Leitzel said it is a great opportunity for veterans to have their tuition covered regardless of residency and acquire the skills they need to move beyond what they already have.

"We are so grateful for their service and this is just and opportunity for us to give back for all that they have done to serve our country," he

said.

In 2012, Florida ranked third in the nation with an estimated 950,000 undocumented immigrants, according to the Pew Research Center.

To qualify for the out-of-state fee waiver, an undocumented student

Much has changed over college's last half-century

VON PARK — South Florida State College will soon kick off a yearlong celebration of its 50th anniversary of being established by the Florida Legislature.

The institution had humble beginnings as South Florida Junior College when it served its first students in August 1966 in renovated buildings in downtown Avon Park.

The classrooms and facilities have changed dramatically over the years since the college's first professors held classes in a former hotel, while an empty supermarket served as the college library and a movie theater parking lot was available for students, employees and visitors.

The college has grown from serving about 300 students in its first year to nearly 6,000 students in a year.

Otters on the hill, but no computers in the classrooms

Oral Communication Professor Lynn MacNeill started teaching at the college in the fall of 1972 in what he called "a very simple set of buildings," on a campus that would look miniature compared to today's set of buildings.

There was no auditorium, B Building (Cornelius Student Services Complex), University Center, Health Science Building and no new library building, he said.

"We used to sit and watch otters come across the hill between the two lakes. The hill is where the auditorium is sitting now," MacNeill noted.

Did the college have any computers

- On Dec. 4, 2002, The Museum of Florida Art and Culture (MOFAC) opened on the Highlands Campus.
- In August 2003, DeSoto Campus officially opens.
- In October 2003, Hardee Campus officially opens.
- An 11-month renovation project transformed the 31-year-old auditorium into the SFCC Theatre for the Performing Arts.

back then?

"We had absolutely no computers," MacNeill said. "In fact, the president [William Stallard] didn't think we needed them.

"That changed immediately upon getting our second president [Catherine Cornelius].'

Everything was hard-copy paper, he said.

MacNeill was hired to teach speech classes, but due to his background he also taught theater history and acting.

But by the mid to late '80s, the college had grown so much that he taught strictly speech classes.

Finishing his 43rd year at the college, MacNeill said, "This a great place to work.

Even though the college has grown significantly, there continues to be a camaraderie among the staff and supportive relationships between the divisions and departments, he said. It's very community and family oriented.

Name change, new leader and new focus

South Florida Junior College became South Florida Community College in March 1984 with Peggy Shackleford, chairman, District Board of Trustees stating at the time, "This name change more clearly identifies the college with its objectives in serving as a community-related institution throughout the three-county college district.'

Catherine Cornelius said recently that when she became the college's president, in July 1984, it had about 78 employees.

"The state was finally starting to move into the computer age, and I was coming from a school that was computerized, Daytona [Daytona Beach Community College]," she said. "I knew that we needed to get that done and we also

needed to get the records converted into computer rather than just in paper files. They were stored in cardboard boxes."

The college was very small at that time and didn't have a big budget, so it didn't have the luxury to do the things that other colleges were doing, Cornelius said. "But we got it done and little by little whittled away on some of the needs that we had."

Many people didn't know about the college, so the focus changed from being "inward" to an "outward" focus so people would know what the college offered and could take came the college's third advantage of those opportunities, she said.

"It was amazing how the response from the community was," Cornelius said. "When we did the Cultural Series that was a way to get people on cam-

pus so they could see what we had.'

The college's Cultural Series, later known as the Artist Series, opened its first season in December 1984 with six programs.

Cornelius noted that when she started at the college its total annual budget was \$3.2 million and when she left in 2002 it was \$32 million. Student enrollment tripled during her tenure from 1,000 to 3,000.

A new president, name and continued growth

Norm Stephens Jr. bepresident on Sept. 3, 2002.

Looking back at his 11 years at the college, Stephens said one of the most significant milestones was introducing the bachelor degree programs and going through the required

accreditation process to offer four-year degrees.

Stephens gave credit to Cornelius and noted current president Thomas Leitzel in the college's ongoing effort to hire "truly outstanding faculty.

"If you have outstanding faculty then your students are satisfied, the community is satisfied and people learn."

Stephens noted significant improvements in the college's facilities.

"When I arrived, I felt our science and health facilities were not up to what they needed to be," he said.

Stephens noted that he has a chemistry background so when he checked the college's chemistry lab it looked good by 1970s standards but not for the 2000 decade.

Also, the nursing program was in cramped

quarters, so the college was able to get the funding to build a state-of-the-art facility for the sciences and the STEM program (science, technology, engineering, mathematics), he said.

Classes started in the Health and Science Education Center in August 2007. The center is now named in Stephens' honor.

Stephens also noted the renovation of the college's auditorium as a major highlight of his tenure.

50th anniversary celebration

Thomas Leitzel became the college's fourth president on July 1, 2013.

As he welcomed students Wednesday at the start of the Spring Semester, Leitzel said the 50th anniversary is exciting and a big year for the college.

Student enrollment looks strong and the college has "good momentum going on."

The college's website lists about a dozen events hosted by SFSC and the SFSC Foundation to mark the 50th anniversary mile-

The first event is a Family Fun Day, Feb. 7 at the DeSoto Campus in conjunction with the DeSoto Arts and Humanities Council's annual Art of the River Show.

Leitzel noted that the celebration at the Highlands Campus starts on Valentine's Day, Feb. 14, with family activities in conjunction with a softball/baseball double header at Panther Field.

SFSC's EMS program earns national accreditation

School meets high standards set by commission

AVON PARK — South Florida State College now offers the only nationally accredited emergency medical services program in its service district of Highlands, Hardee and DeSoto counties.

The program received initial accreditation through Jan. 31, 2020, from the largest programmatic accreditor in the health sciences field, the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs,

CAAHEP accreditation is a mark of distinction, certifying that an EMS program adheres to the highest national standards of education. Notification of SFSC's EMS program accreditation came to Dr. Thomas Leitzel, SFSC president, on Jan. 16 in a letter from CAAHEP President

Dr. Thomas Skalko, congratulating the college on its achievement and commitment to continuous quality improvement in education.

SFSC's site visit report listed no deficiencies and 100 percent compliance with CAAHEP standards and minimum outcomes thresholds. The Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for the Emergency Medical Services Professions will regularly monitor the program's compliances with the outcomes assessment threshold through the program's annual report as well as other documentation that may be requested.

To be accredited, programs must meet a set of nationally established standards and undergo an intensive process that includes a peer review and onsite visitations conducted by the CoA EMSP and CAAHEP's board of directors.

Those standards encompass

not only faculty but also administration, resources, facilities, equipment, progress and competency, and clinical partnerships related to the accredited program.

To become a certified paramedic in Florida, students must attend an accredited program and pass the state of Florida paramedic certification examination. Graduates are also eligible to take the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic Skills Examination and Computer Based Test. While awaiting the full accreditation, graduates of the SFSC's EMS program have been eligible to take these exams thanks to a Letter of Review from CAAHEP.

As a result, students who graduate from CAAHEP-accredited institutions are more readily accepted into other advanced degree EMS programs and have broader employment opportunities — nationally and internationally.
