



SFSC Dean Appelquist to retire

Foundation head ends 45-year career with school June 30

AVON PARK - In August 1970, a new professor at then-South Florida Junior College stepped into a classroom to teach biolo-

On June 30, after years of teachand more years of leading the college's foundation, Don Appelquist will be retiring.

His current title is dean of resource development and foundation.

Appelquist said Wednesday that his title has changed over the years, but he has been in his current position as head of the foundation since 1987.

"At the end of June when I retire, I will have been here 45 years," he noted.

When he started as a biology professor it was soon after the campus moved from downtown Avon Park to its current loca-

tion, Appelquist said.

"I would estimate from 1987 on through to today that we've raised about \$30 million in our three counties and beyond, but primarily in our three counties," he said. "And most of that has gone to provide scholarship assistance for needy students ... although we do have a permanent endowment now that is in the neighborhood of \$13 million."

SFSC Board of Trustees member Joe Wright said Appelquist has had a fabulous career with the college and has been a tremendous asset.

then-President Catherine Cornelius organized the college's foundation, Wright said.

"Our college had a foundation at a time when very few community colleges in the entire country had foundations, and Dr. Cornelius handpicked Don Appelquist to run it and he has done a fabulous job with it," he said. "It really has been a great success story.

Appelquist said the college has been a wonderful place to spend a career. He enjoyed working with the students.

"I really enjoyed teaching ... also since I have been doing resource development, I enjoy the fact that a lot of students have been able to pursue their dreams of a higher eduwise been able to do it without the help of our local citizens and the scholarship money that we

Probably between 200 and 300 students per year have been helped, Appelquist said.

When he retires, Appelquist said he will likely continue to live in the area and will pursue his many interests.

"I will be doing some traveling and maybe doing some writing," he said.

The college will be advertising to fill his position, Appelquist said. "We are hoping to be able to bring somebody in so that I can overlap with them for about a month before I leave."



AVON PARK-The South Florida State College Panthers last Saturday showed they still have some fight left in them this softball

season. Taking on out-of-town opponent, Lincoln **Land Community** College from Illinois, the

Panthers held on to win the first game 6-5 and lost the second game 5-1. The split left SFSC with an 8-18 record on the season.

In the opener, the Panthers started out strong as Shelby Press led off the game with a single and Elizabeth

Fording and Paige Davis walked to load the bases. Press scored on a wild pitch and singles

by Danielle Garcia and Samantha Vance brought home Fording and Davis to give the Panthers a 3-0 lead.

Leading 3-1 heading

into the bottom of the third inning, the Panthers added three more runs for a 6-1 advantage. Halev Pinterich led off with a double to the right center gap. A bunt single by Amber Duncan and a hit batsman then loaded the bases.

Pinterich scored on a fielder's choice by Vance. She and Garcia later scored when the Logger's first baseman committed two errors on one play. The first baseman first misplayed a groundball by Rachel Reinbott. Unable to make the play, she committed a throwing error to home

plate, allowing two runs to score, giving SFSC a five-run lead.

The Loggers fought back in the fifth inning with a base hit and took advantage of two Panther errors to score three runs and cut SFSC's lead to two runs.

The Panthers committed another error in the sixth inning - five for the game - that eventually led to another Logger run as Lincoln Land trimmed the Panthers' lead to one, 6-5. Despite a scare in the seventh inning, the Panthers held on to win.

SFSC carried the momentum of the opening-game win to take a 1-0 lead in the first inning of the second game. Taking advantage of a Logger error,

Pinterich hit her third double of the day into the right center gap to drive in Duncan. The tide began to

shift, though, in the second inning when the Panthers were unable to score after loading the bases on two hits and a walk. It would be the last hit for the Panthers as they were held scoreless for the rest of the game. The Loggers tied the

game in the fourth inning on base hits. In the fifth, they scored three runs on two singles, a double and a Panther error to take a 4-1 lead. The Loggers scored once in the seventh when a two-out error on the Panthers third baseman opened the door as consecutive singles made the final score 5-1.

COLLEGE BASEBALL ROUNDUP

AVON PARK — The South Florida State College Panthers baseball team has slipped into a six-game slide after going one game over .500 and battling to a 2-1 record in the Suncoast Conference.

With their record at 13-13 overall, the Panthers dropped the opener of a three-game set to conference opponent, Hillsborough Community College, by an 8-1 score.

The Panthers battled back to win the next two games against Hillsborough, 2-1 and 3-2.

SFSC couldn't continue the

momentum, however, in the opener of a three-game series against conference juggernaut, St. Pete College, last Wednesday. The Panthers let a four-run lead slip away in a 5-4

loss.

Sandwiched between the threegame series was a 9-1 loss to Lincoln Land Community College from Illinois last Thursday. SFSC then hosted St. Pete College for the second time and fell 8-4 on Friday. The Panthers then traveled to Clearwater on Saturday for another contest with the Titans and lost 6-2.

SFSC's slide continued on Monday when it fell to State College of Florida

in Bradenton, 10-1. The Panthers' sixth consecutive loss dropped them to 15-19 overall, 2-5 in the conference.

SFSC rlearly pulled one out, however, against St. Pete College in last Friday's showdown. Tyler Knowles started for the Panthers and rolled through the batting order the first time around.

Later, with two outs in the third

inning, Knowles walked a batter that opened the door for St. Pete. A fielder's choice, an error on the shortstop and a single accounted for two runs before Knowles could get out of the inning. With SFSC trailing 2-0, the

Panthers' Harrison McClure homered

in the bottom of the third to cut St. Pete's lead in half. The Panthers then took the lead in the bottom of the fourth on singles by John Tatum, Tobias Culpepper and McClure.
Culpepper drove home Tatum to tie the game at 2-2 and Culpepper scored on a hit by McClure for a 3-2 lead.

Knowles worked into the sixth inning where he struck out the side, but those strikeouts were intertwined with a leadoff walk and a pair of base hits that resulted in St. Pete tying the game at 3-3.

Knowles left the game after the sixth inning, scattering five hits and

giving up three runs, of which only one was earned. He also had eight strikeouts.

"His pitch count got too high in the accumulation of six innings," SFSC coach Rick Hitt said. "When you bunch them (pitches) up in a couple of innings, it does not give you an opportunity for

longevity in the game. We were hoping

to get him a little deeper."

In the seventh, the Panthers brought in TJ Vasquez, who was rocked for four runs on four hits and did not survive the inning. SFSC then brought in Isna Dean, who played well until the ninth inning when two defensive errors resulted in St Pete's eighth run being scored.

Dean finished the game, pitching 2.2 innings with no earned runs on one hit.

The Panthers tried to rally in the bottom of the ninth, but only scored once as Avon Park's Alfred Brown singled in McClure to make the final score 8-4.

"It is the second conference game we have given up the lead," Hitt said. "It is unfortunate, but we got to figure out how to keep the lead."

SFSC hosts the State College of Florida today at 6 p.m. before visiting the Titans on Friday at 6 p.m.


