#### 9.1 Financial Report

Ms. Lee reported on the financial graphs and a summary of revenue and expenditures through the month of February 2018. *(EXHIBIT "F")* 

Ms. Lee shared with the Board she is currently working on an estimation of the fund balance. She announced the year-end closing for the college will be effective April 2.

#### 9.2 Foundation Report

Mrs. Bateman reported that the South Florida State College Foundation, Inc. had received donations and pledges in the amount of \$6,787.90 from February 7 through March 6, 2018. Mrs. Bateman shared this does not include a pledge of \$10,000 for our Partnership Project that was received. She announced that all the endowed chairs have been awarded. Mrs. Bateman gave an update to the Board on the up-coming Spring Foundation Gala. She gave a special thank you to Trustee Lambert for the floral arrangements that will be at the tables. Mrs. Bateman shared information on the Alumni Association Networking Luncheon. Mrs. Bateman announced that during the week of Teacher Appreciation SFSC alumni can come back to recognize their professors and can make a donation in their honor to the Foundation Partnership Project. Mrs. Bateman shared that she was in attendance at the Florida Citrus Hall of Fame honoring Mr. Marvin Kahn, who is a good friend to the Foundation and college. She updated the Board on the new Spring Newsletter and the ways one can give to the Foundation. Mrs. Bateman highlighted the tenants at the Shopkeepers Reveal event hosted at the Hotel Jacaranda. Mrs. Bateman informed the Board that TSIC took senior high school students on a tour of UCF where they were hosted by previous TSIC seniors.

#### 9.3 <u>Resource Development</u>

#### I. Grants Development Report

Dr. Lynch distributed and reviewed the Grants Development Report dated 3/28/18. Dr. Lynch gave an update on the Orange Juice to Olive Oil project. She gave a recap on the grant and benefits of an olive crop in Florida. Dr. Lynch shared Dr. Cate Cover, Ms. Kendall Carson and Highlands County 4H students planted 410 olive trees over Spring Break in the SFSC Research Grove. She highlighted five different types of olive trees, including imported varieties from Tunisia make that 410 that were planted. She shared the next steps for the olive grove which include, expanding to 500 trees, engaging students in olive research, collecting data on agronomic practices, developing an integrated pest management plan, and hosting a grower field day in the fall. Mrs. Cullens asked Dr. Lynch if she knew what the supply and demand is in olive industry. Dr. Lynch stated she is currently working on that information. She stated there will be lots of research and trial/error will be happening during this process. Mr. Lambert elaborated on olive oil research in Hardee County and the process to the Board. Dr. Lynch addressed additional questions from the Board.

## 9.4 President's Report

Dr. Leitzel reported on the following college activities:

- 1. Shared the new college PowerPoint template. He thanked Mrs. Kuehnle for her work on this.
- 2. Shared highlights from March 2018: College Week. Mrs. Cullens thanked Mrs. Kuehnle for her quick turn-a-round on a request she needed.
- 3. Informed the Board on the new SACSCOC Accreditation Standards. He gave the Board a hand-out on Section 4: Governing Board. He gave a brief background on Section 4. Also, attached to the hand-out was the 2018 Trustee Manual. He stated the new accreditation principles will be covered with Leader Team at the summer retreat.
- 4. Thanked Ms. Garren for leading the March 8 International Women's Day and everyone that help make it possible.
- 5. Highlighted Up-Coming Events: Cultural Arts REVEAL Dinner on April 24 at the Grogan Center; Foundation Gala on April 26 at Sun'N Lake Island View Restaurant; the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Conference on Caring on April 26 at the University Center; Spring Commencement on May 3 (two ceremonies); Leadercast Event on May 4; and Convocation on August 13. Dr. Leitzel shared that Mr. Lee Cockerell will be our special guest speaker at Convocation this year.
- 6. Reported default rates are improving. SFSC defaults have went from 22% last year to 13% this year. He thanked Dr. Wise and Mr. Donna for their hard work.
- 7. Announced the college will host an Employability Skills Panel on April 5. Trustee Bryan will participate as a panelist. Dr. Leitzel thanked Mr. Bryan for his participation.
- 8. Shared the new rankings of the U.S News & World Report Best Colleges. Florida is ranked number on in Higher Education.
- 9. Tallahassee Update: Dr. Leitzel congratulated Mr. Backer, Mr. Bryan, and Dr. Kirschner on their reappointments. He stated that Mrs. Puckorius is still moving forward in the process.

- 10. CRC Update: Dr. Leitzel stated there is a revision to place state colleges into Constitution, with maintaining local control and keeping us a part of the State Department of Education (still included). There is one more meeting in April. It will conclude by May 4 and the final vote will be in November.
- 11. Announced the \$88.7 billion budget passed on March 11.
- 12. Legislative Update: Dr. Leitzel announced there are no changes with the following; governance, performance metrics and system funding. He shared some items to watch include freedom of speech provisions (SB 4), home school dual enrollment costs, and DSO and fund balances for next year. Dr. Leitzel updated the Board with some areas of concern such as PECO funding is \$42 million less for the FCS, there was an increase of at least \$95 million to charter schools, and safe schools funding was \$400 million. Dr. Leitzel announced that SFSC Mobile Welding lab was funded for \$500,000. He thanked Rep. Ben Albritton, Sen. Denise Grimsley, and Silver Palm Consulting as they went to bat for the College to secure funding for this grant. Only three (3) schools received special initiative funding, SFSC being one of them. He announced that he has invited both Rep. Albritton, Sen. Grimsley, and Silver Palm Consulting to attend the Foundation Gala. He shared he would like to recognize them at the gala. Dr. Leitzel shared sample images of Mobile Welding Labs.
- Announced the Omnibus Appropriations passed in Congress on March 22 and signed on March 23. He shared there was an overall increase in education spending \$3.9 billion. Dr. Leitzel announced Pell was increased to \$6,085/year. He stated that Perkins, Adult Ed, and TRIO were funded.

#### 9.5 Board Attorney's Report

Mrs. Karlson reported the Free Expression Act was signed on March 11. She stated that she and Mr. Little will continue to work on policies and procedures pertaining to freedom of speech. Mrs. Karlson stated that her research and options on alcohol on campus was sent to trustees for their review and consideration. Mrs. Karlson opened discussion on the topic. Mrs. Karlson clarified that this is step one in the process. After getting a general census from the Board, Mrs. Karlson stated that she will continue to work with both Dr. Leitzel and Mr. Little on creating a policy for the Board to review and approval.

#### 9.6 Board Members' Reports

Mrs. Puckorius stated no report.

Mr. Bryan asked Dr. Leitzel what measures has SFSC taken to expand safety on all campus locations. Dr. Leitzel and several employees involved in the process shared with the Board the measures SFSC is taking to help secure all campus locations.

Mr. Lambert thanked Dr. Leitzel and team. He stated that safety measures are a difficult discussion. He wished everyone a Happy Easter.

Mr. Wright added some input to the previous discussion of safety measures at the college.

Dr. Kirschner stated no report.

Mrs. Cullens wished everyone a Happy Easter.

Mrs. Kris Rider wished everyone a Happy Easter.

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## 9.7 Board Chair Report

Mr. Backer recognized Mrs. Bennett's birthday. He shared how wonderful the shows have been at the theatre. He wished everyone a Happy Easter.

# SUBJECT: PRESENTATION - STUDENT LIFE, ACTIVITIES, SERVICES AND ATHLETICS

SGA leadership and other clubs and organizations will introduce members and share accomplishments and high points of the academic year. Our academic and athletic teams are included.

<u>SGA Clubs and Organizations</u> - This has been a student driven, fun filled year as the students have celebrated old traditions and started new ones as well. The events and activities of the year were set forth by the SGA E-Board (Executive Board) during the fall of 2017.

- Rotaract (Tina Gottus) Rotaract assisted the local Rotary clubs with their fundraisers from the wild
  game dinner, the apple sale, and the blueberry festival. The "are you smarter than a Rotarian" event
  that allows local middle school advanced students to compete against Rotarians was moved to the
  college this year exposing future students to our campus. The questions for this event was developed
  and judged by Rotaract Club.
- Anime and Gaming Club (Lisa Johnson-Decarie) During the year we participated in bi-monthly SGA meetings, Club Rush, attended pep rallies, participated in the Sebring Holiday Parade and College Week as well as both End of Semester Parties As a club we sold chocolate bars and held a gaming competition for the whole Student Body.
- IHI (Kathleen Cappo) The students in Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) Chapter are engaged in fundraising to send at least two students to an IHI Form next December in Orlando. They are also have started Facebook page and would continue to recruitment of healthcare students from all disciplines to engage in the club and take on leader roles in the Chapter for the next year. They have also discussed community outreach projects.
- **Basketball Club (Rob Hampton)** The Basketball Club has met and played basketball twice a week for the entirety of the school year. They participated in Club Rush & College Week as well as putting on an Intramural Basketball Tournament for the Student Body.
- Veterans Club (Rob Hampton) The Veterans Club has held monthly clubs meetings, as well as attending bi-weekly SGA Meetings. They have participated in many SGA Sponsored Events such as Club Rush, Pep Rally, & College Week. They have also organized a camping trip for the group.
- Honors Ambassadors (Charlotte Pressler) Honors Ambassadors, including members of the Honors Program from Arcadia, Avon Park, and Sebring are stepping into their role as future community leaders this year. Our members assisted with MOFAC's Pygmy Fringe Tree Festival on March 9th. In April we partnered with Kristie Vazquez, the City of Sebring CRA Director, at two downtown Sebring events, the Sebring Soda Festival on April 6th and 7th, and the Family Friday on April 13th. Our Ambassadors provided her with a SWOT analysis, and reflected on what more could be done to help Sebring achieve a vibrant city center.

- African American Association (Felecia Dozier) AAA has held monthly clubs meetings, as well as attending bi-weekly SGA Meetings. They have participated in many SGA Sponsored Events such as Club Rush, Pep Rally, & College Week. They also put together an informational campaign for Black History Month that concluded with a Luncheon and a guest speaker.
- **DeSoto County Panther Ambassadors (Asena Mott)** Our Ambassadors participated in the DeSoto Family Fun Day with face painting, mask-making, and origami. They created and displayed a card in Christmas Card Lane, and passed out SFSC bags and candy at the Christmas Parade. They assisted with our annual Art Show by setting up, parking cars, and cleaning up. They served food for Leadership Desoto's Vintage Vegas event, and will be serving food at our upcoming Lineman Rodeo. Students plan to celebrate at the end of the year with a trip to the Tampa Aquarium.
- Student Practical Nurses Association (Helen Shoemaker) The Practical Nursing Club participated in both Club Rush events, Christmas parades, and the commencement. 19 members gave blood at the blood bank in February. Members visited the Wound care center, Highlands County Jail, Renal Center, Highlands County Health Department, Hospice House, and Radiology Oncology Center.
- Phi Theta Kappa (Sonji Nicholas & Michelle Macbeth) PTK was very active on campus, as well as off. In addition to maintaining their exemplary studies, PTK students participated in monthly club meetings, bi-weekly SGA meetings, as well as various events, such as: Club Rush, Pep Rally, College Week, and End of Semester Parties. They also attended several conferences off-campus, with some of their students receiving awards.
- Dental Student Association (Bob Sconyers) The Dental Students have attended lunches with Phillips Sonicare, as well as Vision Classes to learn about Dentistry. They have also worked at various clinics, both in and out of county. Last they have assisted with the Healthy Smiles Event at Disney.
- Hardee Campus Ambassadors (Katrina Blandin) The Hardee Ambassadors have acted as the governing body on the Hardee Campus by putting on events such as leadership sessions and Club Rush. They have been instrumental in increasing student participation at one of our satellite locations.
- Phi Beta Lambda (Adam Martin) PBL has held monthly clubs meetings, as well as attending biweekly SGA Meetings. They have participated in many SGA Sponsored Events such as Club Rush, Pep Rally, & College Week. They were also very involved in the Christmas Parades. They have also had a very successful year competing at the Regional and State Level Competitions.
- Campus Christian Club (Michelle Devane) The Campus Christian Club and Fellowship of Christian Athletes Club joined forces this year. The club members and their sponsor met bi-monthly. Student speakers took turn presenting a message during the meetings. Lunch was provided by the sponsor. Four club members attended the State Collegiate Conference at the Lake Yale Conference Center in Leesburg, Florida, for a three day leadership conference. Club members collected nonperishables and water bottles for victims of Hurricane Harvey and participated in the See You at the Pole event. Prior to Winter Break, club members created "Buckets of Christmas Cheer" filled with candy, a bible verse, and note of appreciation to every SFSC department office.
- **College Republicans (Lyndsey Lynch)** The College Republicans has held monthly clubs meetings, as well as attending bi-weekly SGA Meetings. They have participated in many SGA Sponsored Events such as Club Rush, Pep Rally, & College Week. They were also very involved in the Christmas Parades.
- Latin American Student Organization (Tasha Morales) LSO was instrumental throughout the year helping build a culturally sensitive campus by participating in a focus group per our President's request, assisted with SGA activities, contributed to Latin Heritage Month, and helped fundraise money for their club trip to Busch Gardens.
- Student Nurses Association (Dawn Pisarski) Student Nurses Association (SNA) had an active year. SNA members attended the Florida Nursing Students Association Convention held in Tarpon Springs, Florida. Students were able to attend classes and network with student nurses from across Florida and host a fundraising table. Students have been active with several fundraising and community service events.

- Radiography Club (Junior Gray) SFSC's Radiography Club currently consists of 23 members. It has been a busy year with classes and clinical rotations as well as being actively involved in Student Government Association events, such as, Latin Heritage Month, College Week, Black History Month and monthly meetings. Currently, our second-year members are preparing for both their pinning and graduation ceremonies as well as their National Registry examination, while the first-year members are currently working on an interactive presentation they will be presenting at the Caring Seminar scheduled Thursday, April 26, in the University Center.
- Brain Bowl (Lena Phelps & David Zoerb) During the 2017-2018 year, the Brain Bowl team gained many new players from the Highlands and DeSoto campuses. The team competed in tournaments at Valencia College, State College of Florida, College of Central Florida and Santa Fe College, then won a bid to go to the National Tournament in Chicago where the team finished with 6 wins and 5 losses. Two players ranked in the top 50 -- Team captain Mathew Daniel ranked 19th and player Juan Perez ranked 32nd. The students are now preparing for semi-annual the Battle of Brains against the FASTeam consisting of faculty and staff on April 19th.
- Art Club (Karla Respress) The Art Club continued its tradition of off campus field trips, this year to the Chihuly Museum, The Moran Glassblowing Hot Shop, The Saint Petersburg Clay Company, The Polk Museum of Art, and Bok Tower Garden. This year the Art Club Members also enjoyed attending events at the Performing Arts Center, creating art on Open Studio Fridays, pit firing pottery, making their own pen and ink during a MOFAC workshop, and sponsoring the People's Choice Award at the Annual Juried Student Art Show.
- Jac Pac (Kendra Wellnitz) This academic year 2017-2018 has been a busy one. The Jac Pac has thrown Birthday parties monthly for the residents including food and party décor. We had representation at college week. We have also had Health and wellness awareness meetings every two months.
- Volleyball Club (Ricardo Pantoja) A successful year for our first year, promoting camaraderie and teamwork by playing volleyball weekly.

#### Athletic Teams

Panther Student Athletes from Baseball, Softball, Cross Country, and Volleyball teams will be presented by respective coaches and will introduce themselves. Coach Hitt, Athletic Director, will also share some season highlights.

## Student Government

Besides the very active clubs, the Student Government of SFSC planned and carried out wonderful events this year which inspired learning and fun. These included: Welcome Back, an event designed to Welcome Students to Campus at the beginning of each semester, the Students passed out waters, planners, and maps, then made sure all new or returning Students knew their way to Class, End of Semester Party in the Fall and Spring with the Fall consisting of a Casino Night, and the Spring will be a Pool Party with a Bar-B-Q; Panther Pride Pep Rally done in both the Fall and the Spring, a pep rally designed to boost athletic involvement throughout the year; student forum with Dr. Leitzel; a Student Leadership Workshop Series designed to provide quality speakers and workshops to aid students and sharpen their leadership skills; FCSSGA state leadership conferences including the Rally in Tally; intramural basketball, football, & soccer; College Week, a weeklong series of events that was participated in by over 20 teams comprised of students & faculty/staff that leads to an overall champion; fall and spring Club Rush to encourage student participation in organizations; a Halloween/Karaoke Themed Fall Fest Party with food, games, music, dancing, & a costume party: a Women's Self-Defense Class & an Active Shooter Class, to give students the necessary information to be able to protect themselves; a Latin American Heritage Month & a Black History Month Program that each concluded with a Luncheon; and general SGA meetings every other Wednesday. # SUBJECT: PRESENTATION - ANNUAL EQUITY UPDATE REPORT

In compliance with the Florida Educational Equity Act (§1000.05, Florida Statutes (F.S.)) and the Florida College System Employment Equity Accountability Program (§1012.86 F.S.), South Florida State College maintains a comprehensive equity plan which documents the college's continual efforts to address areas of underrepresentation of minorities in its academic programs, activities, and employment. The plan is updated annually and submitted to the Office of Equity and Civil Rights Compliance, Division of Florida Colleges, Florida Department of Education (FLDOE) in the form of the Annual Equity Update Report.

The report articulates several measurable goals and objectives related to promoting diversity and ensuring equal access and opportunity for admission to and employment in educational programs and activities; strategies for accomplishing these goals and objectives are provided. The report also furnishes a thorough description of the process for reviewing policies and procedures related to equal opportunity, non-discrimination, and employment accountability as prescribed in the statutes above. Included in these descriptions is the procedure for granting continuing contract status to faculty and evaluating the college president and other senior-level administrative staff.

The process used to prepare SFSC's Annual Equity Update Report entails data collection, analysis and input from several key college faculty, staff, and administrators. The report is submitted in electronic and hard copy formats to the Director, Equity and Civil Rights Compliance, Division of Florida Colleges, Florida Department of Education. It subsequently undergoes a thorough review to ensure compliance; recommendations for improvement, if required, are provided to the college.

The report is forwarded to the President of the Senate and to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, each year, to provide a system-wide progress report on equity and access.

The report is available under separate cover. The presentation of the Annual Equity Update Report to be given at the meeting includes FLDOE comments regarding the 2017 report and seeks the acceptance of the 2017-2018 report from the District Board of Trustees under agenda item 8.1.

External persons or groups who wish to hold a speaking event or make a presentation on campus must submit their request in writing to the President's Office 72 hours prior to such an event and should refer to Policy 7.05 pertaining to Use of Facilities.

OFFICE OF PRIMARY RESPONSIBILITY: VICE PRESIDENT FOR ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES/ HUMAN RESOURCES

South Florida State College is committed to providing an educational and work environment free from harassment and prohibited discrimination based on such factors as race, color, religion, gender, national origin, ethnicity, age, disability, marital status, political affiliation, sexual orientation, genetic information, or pregnancy.

The college will not tolerate prohibited harassment or discrimination of its applicants, employees or students by employees, students, or vendors and will attempt to protect its students and employees from non-student or non-employee harassment.

Each complaint of harassment or discrimination that is reported to a college official shall be investigated thoroughly, promptly, and with an emphasis on confidentiality. Retaliation against any applicant, employee or student for making a complaint or reporting harassment will not be tolerated.

The president is authorized to create and maintain procedures for prompt corrective action up to and including termination of employment for employees or dismissal from the educational program for students consistent with due process.

Harassment or discrimination includes:

A. Any slurs, innuendoes, or other verbal or physical conduct reflecting on an individual's race, color, religion, gender, national origin, ethnicity, age, disability, marital status, political affiliation, sexual orientation, genetic information, or pregnancy which with respect to student on student is unwelcome; directed at an individual; and so severe, pervasive, and objectively offensive that it effectively bars the victim's access to an educational opportunity or benefit, or with respect to employment, has the purpose or effect of creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive educational or work environment; has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with the individual's work or school

performance or participation; or otherwise adversely affects an individual's employment or educational opportunities;

- B. The denial of, or the provision of, aid, benefits, grades, rewards, employment, faculty assistance, services, or treatment on the basis of sexual advances or requests for sexual favors; and/or
- C. Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition on an individual's employment or education; submission to or rejection of such conduct is used as a basis for educational or employment decisions affecting the individual; or such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work or educational performance or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive working or educational environment; or with respect to student on student is unwelcome; directed at an individual; and so severe, pervasive, and objectively offensive that it effectively bars the victim's access to an educational opportunity or benefit.

The president shall establish procedures for college personnel and students who wish to file a complaint dealing with alleged harassment and/or discrimination. The president will ensure that these procedures and any related notices include the name(s) or titles(s), complete telephone number, and mailing address of the individual(s) responsible for handling the concerns of applicants, students, or employees who feel they have been harassed or discriminated against.

POLICY NO. 2.21

TITLE: FREE EXPRESSION

LEGAL AUTHORITY: FLORIDA STATUTE 1004.097 (Campus Free Expression Act)

OFFICE OF PRIMARY RESPONSIBILITY: PRESIDENT'S OFFICE

Definitions:

Commercial Speech: speech in which the individual is engaged in commerce, the intended audience is commercial or actual or potential consumers, and the content of the message is commercial.

Free Speech Zone: an area on a campus of the college which is designated for the purpose of engaging in expressive activities.

Material and Substantial Disruption: any conduct that intentionally and significantly hinders another person's or group's expressive rights. The term does not include conduct that is protected under the First Amendment to the United States Constitution and Art. I of the State Constitution, including, but not limited to, lawful protests and counter-protests in the outdoor areas of campus or minor, brief, or fleeting nonviolent disruptions that are isolated or brief in duration.

Outdoor Areas of Campus: generally accessible areas of a campus of a public institution of higher education in which members of the campus community are commonly allowed, including grassy areas, walkways, or other similar common areas. The term does not include outdoor areas of campus to which access is restricted.

#### Right to Free-Speech Activities

Expressive activities protected under the First Amendment to the United States Constitution and Art. I of the State Constitution include, but are not limited to, any lawful oral or written communication of ideas, including all forms of peaceful assembly, protests, and speeches; distributing literature; carrying signs; circulating petitions; and the recording and publication, including the internet publication, of video or audio recorded in outdoor areas of campus. Expressive activities protected by this section do not include commercial speech.

A person who wishes to engage in an expressive activity in outdoor areas of campus may do so freely, spontaneously, and contemporaneously as long as the person's conduct is lawful and does not materially and substantially disrupt the functioning of the college or infringe upon the rights of other individuals or organizations to engage in expressive activities.

Outdoor areas of campus are considered traditional public forums for individuals, organizations, and guest speakers. The president or designee may create and enforce restrictions that are reasonable and content-neutral on time, place, and manner of expression and that are narrowly tailored to a significant institutional interest. Restrictions must be clear and published and must and provide for ample alternative means of expression.

The college will not designate any area of campus as a free-speech zone or otherwise create policies restricting expressive activities to a particular outdoor area of campus, except as provided in the prior paragraph.

Students, faculty, or staff may not materially disrupt previously scheduled or reserved activities on campus occurring at the same time.

A person whose expressive rights are violated by an action prohibited under this section may seek relief pursuant to Florida Statute 1004.097.








Through guided practice in collection, processing, and documentation of biological samples, the team of researchers will establish a genetic database of the Lake Wales Ridge ecosystem.

### Title: Healthy Smiles for Highlands County

Amount: \$19,000

Description: The SFSC Division of Health Sciences is requesting funds to continue to provide preventive dental services to high-need populations throughout Highlands County, including children, indigent adults, and residents with special needs. Funds are being requested this cycle to expand services to include a special program for pregnant women, as periodontal conditions have been found to contribute to pre-term labor. SFSC dental and nursing students will work together to provide high-risk pregnant women and their caregivers with targeted health education to prevent pre-term and low-weight births. The women will also receive free dental hygiene cleanings at the SFSC dental clinic.
