#### Artist reception for MOFAC exhibition of Riverview artist Marlon Tobias

AVON PARK - "We Live on Old Dixie HWY Too" features recent paintings and installations by New College of Florida drawing instructor Marlon Tobias. An artist reception for the exhibition was held Wednesday, Jan. 11, at the Museum of Florida Art and Culture (MOFAC) on the South Florida State College Highlands Campus in Avon Park. The exhibition is on view through

"Marlon Tobias is an artist with an archival practice," said Anthony Record, MOFAC curator. "He uses this incredible wealth of archival material that has been passed down to him from the maternal side of his family as the subject of his art. Things like family photos, letters, legal documents, even collect- with a remarkable ed objects like silverware and achievement awards inform his paintings and are included in his

installations."

In the mid-1800s, Tobias' great-great-grandfather, Cubby Wardlaw, acquired land in Callahan, a small, rural town in Florida about 15 miles north of Jacksonville, and his family has established and maintained a community there.

"Tobias is working amount of Black history and Florida history that his family has been a part of and

documented," Record said.

As African Americans in the mostly white town of Callahan, Tobias' family lived under the constant threat of being displaced by their white neighbors. Their meticulous record-keeping was a strategy for clearly establishing and documenting their history on the land, their legal ownership of property and wealth, and to control how these things were maintained and transferred to the

next generation. They even used Robert's Rules of Order and would take meeting minutes for regular family meetings which have been saved.

"Tobias' paintings, installations, and collected objects tell stories that give us an intimate view of the people that played a pivotal role in the development of this community in Callahan," Record said. "Tobias says that every person's life is history, and his work allows us to meet these

people from the past, to learn from that history and relate to how they lived, organized, and thrived.'

Kaitlyn Jones sang the hymn "Lift Every Voice and Sing."

The Ridge Area Seventh-Day Adventist Youth Choir performed two songs: one featuring a soloist who performed the Mahalia Jackson hymn, "How I Got Over," and the choir sang the Christmas song, "Pretty Little Baby Child."


Timika School sang the hymn "The Old Rugged Cross."

#### Lviv National Philharmonic Orchestra Of Ukraine To Performs Today At SFSC

Founded in 1902, the Lviv National Philharmonic Orchestra of Ukraine is one of its nation's largest and most internationally known ensembles. South Florida State College (SFSC) in Avon Park is honored to host the Orchestra at the 1,460-seat Center for the Performing Arts today (Thursday), Jan. 19 at 7 p.m.

'This concert and the Orchestra's American tour is a testament to the power of music to overcome adversity," said Cindy Garren, director of cultural programs at

The Lviv National Philharmonic Orchestra of Ukraine was established in the medieval city of Lviv in 1902. The Orchestra has toured extensively around the world to countries including Poland, Spain, France, Switzerland, Germany, and The People's Republic of China. During the past several seasons, they have completed highly acclaimed recordings for major international labels including Naxos, Toccata Classics, and Brilliant Classics.

The multiple award-winning conductor, Theodore Kuchar, is the most recorded conductor of his generation. Stanislav Khristenko, who has been called a "poet of piano," is the featured soloist, performing Chamber Symphony No. 3 for flute and string orchestra. The Chamber Symphony No. 3 was composed by the contemporary Ukrainian composer, Yevhen Stankovich.

The program will include Beethoven's Symphony No. 7 in A major, Opus 92. This symphony was completed in 1812, the year in which Napoleon was beginning to fail in his conquests. Celebrating this turn of events, the Seventh Symphony premiered at a concert in Vienna on Dec. 8, 1813 to benefit troops wounded in the Battle of Hanau, a small but tactical victory on Oct. 31, 1813, which routed Napoleon into a retreat in the War of the Sixth Coalition.

During the tour, the Lviv Orchestra of Ukraine will appear at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center for the Arts in Washington, D.C., and 38 cities throughout the United States.

"I am proud that South Florida State College is presenting these remarkable musicians," Garren said. "Orchestra members needed special permission to leave their country during this wartorn time. I am asking all music lovers to show their support for these artists and their country."

## SFSC enrollment up in fall and spring

AVON PARK — South Florida State College's enrollment has increased and street signs will be going up soon on the Avon Park campus.

At the recent meeting of the SFSC District Board of Trustees, SFSC President Thomas Leitzel said the 2022 fall enrollment, including adult education, was up 4.4%.

Spring's first day (credit) enrollment (Jan. 9) was up 1.43%.

The campus/center numbers (excluding adult education and supplemental) comparing Jan. 9, 2022, to Jan. 9, 2023, show an 8.1% increase at Avon Park, 21% increase at DeSoto, no change at Hardee and a decrease of 9.5% at Lake Placid.

Virtual enrollment was down 2.6% from 1,638 to 1,595 students.

The college is leveling out in virtual education, Leitzel said. He said it may be plateauing after it reached an all-time high during the pandemic when the college was offering virtual classes to 75% of the student body, but it is coming down. He believes virtual may not hold the appeal that it once did when the college was fully operational with virtual classes. He called it a good sign.

He recommended the Board of Trustees consider updating the college's facilities master plan in coordination with the new president. It was last updated in 2009 so it is time for an update.

Leitzel showed a map of the Avon Park campus with its roads because the County and Sheriff's Office wants the streets named and the buildings numbered.

The idea was to name the streets after the college's core values, he said.

The core values are: integrity, service, community, learning, excellence, accountability and responsibility.

The college proposed "service," but there is already a Service Road in Lake Placid, Leitzel said.

They were going to offer "Saxon Drive" for the road off Lake Glenada Drive that goes into the athletic fields and to the Saxon Field House, he said. But, there is already a Saxon Lane, so they couldn't use that.

The college's roads are now named and the buildings are numbered and everything is consistent with the wishes of the Board of Trustees, Leitzel said. "So you will soon be seeing the green street signs installed and everything is GPS accessible so that is a project that is coming along."

The road that goes in front of the Alan Jay Wildstein Center for the Performing Arts Center, and connects to College Drive in two places, is called Enlightenment Circle. The road passes the Tower of Enlightenment, the cylindrical cooling tower with the Keith Goodson mural.

The other road names on campus, from west to east, are: Excellence, Learning, Reliability, Integrity, Community and
