February 1st (CRN 20393)

. Session A: (9 AM) Florida Stories Nancy Dale, Ph.D., Author

Nancy Dale, author of books *Cattle Ranching on the Border: Deadly Risk and Wild Florida the way it was told by the Pioneer Cow Hunters*, will give you a look back at old Florida and the rugged pioneers who survived disease, drought, floods and varmints to carve a lifestyle in wild Florida.

• Session B: (11 AM) Whip Master –Raymond MacIntyre, Past President of Florida Cracker Trail Association Raymond MacIntyre will bring the stories of the Cracker Cowboys come to life. Learn how the cattle whip was developed and made by hand to drive the cattle across the old south. Step outside and see a demonstration of how the cowboys cracked the whip. You may even want to give it a try!

February 8th (CRN 20394)

• Field Trip (Both Sessions) A Day in Jail, Tour with Retired Colonel Shirley Johnson

Spend a day in jail on our fascinating tour of the Highlands County jail with Retired Colonel Shirley Johnson. Colonel Johnson will highlight areas of interest that are not known to the local public, with interesting facts. An excellent presenter and tour guide, Colonel Johnson, will include history of the Highlands County jail building and what has been redeveloped in our criminal justice system.

February 15th (CRN 20395)

• Session A: (9 AM) Lake Istokpoga Clell J. Ford, Lakes Manager, Highlands County Natural Resources

Lake Istokpoga is called the Liquid Heart of Highlands County. Of the over 100 natural lakes in Highlands County which offers a myriad of joys, challenges and problems to solve, Lake Istokpoga is by far the largest. It is also one of the shallowest lakes we have. Learn about the health of Lake Istokpoga and its 600 square mile watershed that has been altered in subtle ways over the past 60 years.

• Session B: (11 AM) A New Addition to Avon Park, Botanical Garden Project, Nancy Frisk

Nancy Frisk with the Avon Park Historical Society is developing a botanical garden for downtown Avon Park. She is currently working with the Avon Park City Council and Main Street CRA. on this beatification project. Listen to her plans for this project with all Florida friendly plants.

February 22nd (CRN 20397)

Sessions A: (9 AM) Early Christianity, Dale McDaniel, Ph.D., Professor Emeritus and Adjunct Professor

• We will examine Early Christianity from ca. 200 A.D. to 600 A.D. Some of the topics to be covered are: Early Christianity under the roman Empire, the collapse of the Western Roman Empire, The Eastern Roman Empire and Constantine's movement of the capital of the Roman Empire from Rome to Constantinople.

• Session B: (11 a.m.) The History of Avon Park Baseball, Dr. Sevigny, Baseball Historian

Avon Park has a rich history in the sport of baseball. Learn about many of the stars who have played and enriched the game right here. Many players have stayed at the Hotel Jacaranda including Babe Ruth. Attend this session and you may get to see and hold an original Babe Ruth baseball bat!

March 1st Florida Flywheelers (CRN 20400)

• Session A: (9 AM) Florida Fly Wheelers Jane Portier and Tom Simco (CRN 2400)

Florida Fly Wheelers was established in 1972 by a group whose hobby is restoration of old hit and miss gasoline internal combustion engines. It has grown into a 374 acre show grounds in southern Polk county. They host 3 four-day shows yearly and celebrate Christmas in the Village with extensive lighting. Discover more about this amazing place.

• Session B: (11 AM) Sandhill Crane, Reinier Munguia, President of Lake Audubon Society

The Florida Sandhill Crane was once found only in remote wetlands in Florida. With Florida under constant development they can now be spotted in development residential areas. Ms. Munguia will tell us how their environment and survival has changed over the years.

• Session A & B : (9 AM) Field Trip Frank Lloyd Wright at Florida Southern College

Frank Lloyd thought that most college campus were architecture failures and wanted the opportunity to design an entire campus from scratch. We will tour the Florida Southern College campus and buildings on this Field Trip. *Helpful tip: Wear your comfortable shoes as this tour will be an extended walking tour.* Lunch will be pay on your own.

March 22nd - Wild About Ants (CRN 20402)

• Session A (9 AM) Dr. Mark Deyrup, Ph.D., Senior Research Program Director, Archbold Biological Station With over 239 known species of ants, Dr. Deyrup makes a solid case that Florida is a leader in ant diversity if not the 'antiest' state. The different species of ants will be covered and this session will give you a glimpse into the lives of people who collected and named ants in Florida, as well as the scientists who research them.

• Session B (11 AM) Mechatronics, Erik Christensen, Dean, Applied Sciences & Technologies

What is mechatronics and what does it mean for our community? Mechatronics is a multi-disciplinary sub-field of engineer ing that deals with designing and operation of computer-controlled electromechanical system. Mechatronics engineers develop new sustainable solutions to industrial issues and innovate machinery for modern use. Dean Christensen will up date you on all the latest invocations of this new South Florida State College program.

March 29th - 9 AM (CRN 21331) - Meet at the Hotel Jacaranda at 9 AM

• Session A: Genealogy-Jan Grove, Genealogy Society Jan Grove with the Genealogy Society will share information about her family and provide an introduction to Basic Genealogy. This will include how to gather information and evaluate census records.
