Jan 10 (Non-Member Session CRN 20114)

• Session A: (9 a.m.) Pollinators—Dr. Mark Deyrup, Emeritus Research Biologist

If you enjoyed Dr. Deyrup's "Wild About Ants" presentation last year, come back for this year's "Pollinators." With his wealth of knowledge on this subject and his beautiful illustrations, you will be fascinated by these insects that affect our lives in so many ways.

• Session B: (11 a.m.) An Overview of Archbold —Dustin Angell

Dustin Angell is an environmental educator and conservation photographer living and working in the headwaters of Florida's Everglades. As an educational coordinator at Archbold, he interprets and researches the history of the organization and its research priorities for all audiences.

Jan 17 (Non-Member Session CRN 20371)

• Session A: (9 a.m.) Anglo-Saxons in England ca 400—1066—Dr. Ivan McDaniel

We will look at the culture of the Germanic tribes, the Angles, Saxons, and Jutes, in what is now England from their arrival around 40 A.D. to their conquest by the Normans in 1066 A.D. We will also take a look at their history, art, literature and language, especially focusing on the Sutton Hoo ship burial and more recent archeological discoveries.

• Session B: (11 a.m.) Early Bok Tower: The People and The Gardens—Peter Brockmann
Peter Brockmann will guide us through the history of Bok Tower Gardens from concept to the current day.

Jan 24 (Non-Member Session CRN 20369)

• Session A: (9 a.m.) "RSVP" - The Retired and Senior Volunteer Program Overview— Kris Juve "Disaster in a Bucket" - Lea Ann Curry

Kris Juve, Coordinator for the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) for 11 years will share her experience with the program and provide insight on how you can become more involved within your community. Lea Ann serves as the lead disaster preparedness volunteer for (RSVP) and since 2007, has taught nearly 5,000 Highlands County residents (including Snowbirds) the importance of preparing for disasters by creating a family plan. Participants will learn how to create a family disaster plan, build an emergency evacuation kit in a five gallon bucket, and hear "lessons learned" from Hurricane Irma.

• Session B: (11 a.m.) Senior Sleuths: Senior's vs. Crime —Thomas C. Guinther of the Highlands County Sheriff's Office presents this project of the Florida Attorney General wherein "Senior Sleuths" offer free assistance to seniors who have been taken advantage of financially.

Jan 31 (Non-Member—CRN 20374 / LLI Member—CRN 20373)

• Session A & B: Archbold Biological Station: Science, Conservation, and Education in the Florida Heartland

Dustin Angell will provide us with in depth insight into to the history of the research that is being done at Archbold about the interesting and highly threatened ecosystem. You will learn about the plants and animals of the scrub, the rate of fire, and the history of the Lake Wales Ridge. There will also be a guided tour of their learning center and the opportunity to pet a live snake (for those who are interested!). Additionally there will be a half-hour guided tour through some of the scrub land. At the end of the tour, there will be a sandwich bar lunch and the opportunity to ask questions. Feb 7 (Non-Member Session CRN 20320)

• Session A & B: Eagles in Florida—Reinier Manguia, President Lake Audubon Society

There are an estimated 1,500 breeding bald eagle pairs in Florida, which is second to Alaska, in the United States. Bald eagle populations are being monitored in most of Florida and show that our national symbol is thriving, but also faces threats as more of the Sunshine State is developed. Mr. Manguia will tell us how their environment and survival has changed over the years, as well as the impact on other members of the "eagle" family.

Feb 14 (Non-Member Session CRN 20375)

• Session A: (9 a.m.) —Bill Parken, Ranger Florida Fish and Wildlife

The Lake Wales Ridge originated as a series of sand islands more than a million years ago. These sand hills of Central Florida are home to a unique collection of plants and animals found nowhere else in the world.

• Session B: (11 a.m.) —Coyotes in the Heartland, the Ugly Truth—Ray McIntyre & Gator Howerton

With no natural predators, the coyote population in this part of Florida has grown exponentially. Raymond McIntyre and Gator Howerton will share about the harvesting of coyotes in our county. Coyote sightings aren't limited to rural areas, although ranchers and dairy owners have had their run-ins, more recently urban calls have increased as well.

• Session A: (9 a.m.) Florida Aquifer—Jason Patterson

What is an aquifer and why do I care? Jason Patterson, hydrologist, and team member for the central Florida Water Initiative will discuss the Florida aquifer system and how it affects our daily lives via our water supply.

• Session B: (11 a.m.) The Center for Great Apes

The Center for Great Apes was founded in order to provide lifetime care for rescued chimpanzees and orangutans. Learn how this ambitious undertaking began and how it has resulted in an impressive and amazing sanctuary.
