SFSC awarded Florida Pathways to Career Opportunities Grant

Partnership with CareerSource Heartland and AdventHealth for new Healthcare Apprenticeship Program

AVON PARK — South Florida State College (SFSC) is one of seven colleges in Florida awarded with the Florida Pathways to Career Opportunities Grant.

During the 2019 Legislative Session, Governor Ron DeSantis worked with the Florida Legislature to secure historic funding for Florida's students and families, including \$10 million dedicated to career and technical education for the newly created Florida Pathways to Career Opportunities Grant Program. The program provides competitive grants to eligible institutions to create or expand apprenticeship and pre-apprenticeship programs.

SFSC was awarded the grant toward a new Advanced Patient Care Technician (APCT) Apprenticeship program in partnership with CareerSource Heartland and AdventHealth. The program will prepare



apprentices for employment as nursing assistants, home health aides and healthcare support occupations encompassing skills in phlebotomy and electrocardiography.

"This apprenticeship program establishes an opportunity to address the existing workforce gaps especially in our hospital(s) service area. The program also creates meaningful career opportunities for the residents of our local counties," said Randy Surber, chief executive officer (CEO) for AdventHealth.

"It has been a challenge for years to fill such positions and to train and retain individuals at this level of care provision," said Elsie Graves, chief nursing office (CNO) at AdventHealth.

Her perspective on the need to establish such an apprenticeship is that "We always, always need more hands at the bedside. The support such individuals provide can decrease caregiver burnout, provide meaningful work for a community in need, create a life-changing path to success while expanding employees' skillsets. Participation in such a program has tremendous potential to foster economic independence for individuals and their families and opens the door to other career opportunities."

The two-year apprenticeship program begins in January 2020 with an anticipated first cohort enrollment of 12.

"SFSC is grateful for Governor DeSantis' support of the Florida Pathways to Career **Opportunities Grant**," said Dr. Michele Heston, dean of health sciences at SFSC. "The demand for the role of the Advanced Patient Care Technician will address the need for a skilled workforce in health services by contributing to the economic development of the region served.

"The creation of an earn-while-you-learn opportunity for individuals, who otherwise would not be able to advance their careers, will build a more confident and resilient workforce."

The Hit Men ready to rock the hits

AVON PARK - The Hit Men, a supergroup of musicians who have performed in the studio and on stage with dozens of legendary stars, will take the stage at South Florida State College at 7 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 4. In the Alan Jay Wildstein Center for the Performing Arts, you will hear the classic rock songs these five talented sidemen were a part of when they performed with the biggest names in rock history from Paul McCartney and Elton John, to Frankie Valli, Foreigner, The Who, Toto, Carole King, Cat Stevens, Jim Croce, The Rascals and more.

Keyboardist and group

founder Lee Shapiro spoke with Highlands News-Sun recently about his musical background, which included replacing Bob Gaudio in the Four Seasons.

"I was with Frankie [Valli] through the 1970s and when I left I ended up working with Tommy James for a couple of years," he said. Then he didn't perform on stage for many years, but he knew the other musicians that would become The Hit Men through his work in jingles and recording.

When the Broadway play "Jersey Boys" was so big, he spoke to Valli about putting a band together to perform the hits. Valli told him he was one of the Four Seasons so go do it. Now The Hit Men have been

performing for 10 years. Along with Shapiro, The Hit Men includes lead gui-

tarist/vocalist Jimmy Ryan, bassist/vocalist Jeff Ganz, (Johnny Winter, Village People, Leon Russel and Dr. John) keyboardist, percussionist and vocalist Russ Velazquez (The Ramones, Chicago, Luther Vandross and Michael Bolton) and drummer and vocalist Steve Murphy (Alan Parsons, The Turtles, Three Dog Night.) "We don't do any songs unless we were in the band, we toured with the band or we were on the record," Shapiro said. "Like Jimmy Ryan, he was with Carly Simon for 21 years, he is the guitarist on "You're so Vain," and he created that solo. "He recorded with Elton

John and Paul McCartney.

We are the real guys so that is where we grab our tunes from."

The whole show is full of hits they had something to do with and they will share backstories from their experiences on stage and in the studio.

"They [audience] are going to see video archives of us actually performing with the people whose songs we are playing now," he said. For example, when the group performs the Four Seasons' "December, 1963 (Oh, What a Night)" there will be video of Shapiro performing the song in 1976 on the "Midnight Special" television show.

"We tell the people, 'You will leave the theater happier and younger than when you got there,"

Shapiro said.

The members of The Hit Men have appeared on over 85 albums, won multiple gold and platinum recording awards, Emmy nominations, Telly Awards, Clio Awards and more, including the first-ever Road Warriors Award from the Musicians Hall of Fame and Museum.

Tickets for The Hit Men are \$28, \$22, \$15, and child/student tickets are \$10. Groups of 13 or more receive a 25% discount.

South Florida State College (SFSC) has seen r more women in its fall 2019 emergency edical technician (EMT) career certificate ogram than in the past. In fact, eight out of 3 students in the class are women.

Jennifer Serrano, instructor in SFSC's Emerency Medical Services (EMS) programs, was student at the College 10 years ago when the ajority of the students were male.

ajority of the students were male. "EMS has been a predominantly male eld," Serrano said. "But the culture has hanged. It's great to see the shift of having ore females who want to make this their caer, pursuing their dreams, being mentors for ther women, and giving back to their commuties. Working in EMS is an exciting career hich requires critical thinking, while chalnging you every day."

According to the National Registry of Emerency Medical Technicians, men make up aproximately 70 percent of the EMTs in the inited States.

"Over the years, we have seen more women netering the workforce," Serrano said. "SFSC's EMS program has also experienced that growth and it's had a positive impact on our recruitment. As an instructor, it's amazing to see such a diversified group of individuals in our program."

EMTs function as part of an emergency rescue and transportation team by responding to emergency calls through a dispatch system, operating emergency vehicles safely, assessing scenes of accidents or illnesses, setting priorities for treating patients based on their degree of illness or injury, providing pre-hospital emergency care to treat trauma, shock, wounds, and other medical issues.

SFSC's EMT program runs for 16 weeks. Upon completion of the program, graduates are eligible to apply to take the Florida EMT Certification Exam.




Students participating in the Commencement ceremony totaled 208.


