#### Welcome:

Welcome to American History class. I look forward to exploring our nation's history from 1877 with you and I trust that you will find the subject as exciting as I do. This course will cover many topics very quickly so reading your textbook is an absolute must. We will not be able to study all the topics in depth, but my goal is to provide you with the framework and desire to make the study of history one of your lifelong pursuits. You do not have to make your living as a historian to be a student of history. Please feel free to contact me via email or phone if you have any questions.

## **Catalog Description:**

This course surveys American history from 1877 to the present with emphasis on the major economic, social, political, and cultural transformations of the American people since the Civil War, pursuing an essentially chronological approach. (CORE) (CLR) (G.E.) (TR)

#### **Course Specific Outcomes:**

- 1. Analyze the particular factors that made the industrialization of the U.S. possible in the post-Civil War era.
- Summarize the impact of the Progressive movement in the early 20th century.
- 3. Explain the coming of World War I and the U.S. entry into it.
- 4. Describe the social, labor, and racial tensions in the U.S. during the 1920s relating to the Communist threats, labor unrest, black issues, immigration reductions, Ku Klux Klan activity, prohibition, and evolution being taught in the schools.
- 5. Describe the general nature of the American depression in the 1930s and the major features of the New Deal.

- 6. Explain why and how the U.S. went to war in 1941.
- 7. Analyze the reasons for the Cold War and identify the major points of conflict.
- 8. Compare the effectiveness of the various "movements" in the 1960s and 1970s.
- 9. Explain the U.S. involvement in the Vietnam War and describe U.S. participation in it.
- 10. Describe the social trends present in modern America.
- 11. Students will develop and demonstrate an understanding of the basic principles and practices of American democracy and how they are applied in our republican form of government.
- 12. Students will develop and demonstrate an understanding of the United States Constitution and its application.
- 13. Students will develop and demonstrate knowledge of the founding documents and how they have shaped the nature and functions of our institutions of self-governance.
- 14. Students will develop and demonstrate an understanding of landmark Supreme Court cases, landmark legislation, and landmark executive actions and their impact on law and society.

## **Required Course Materials:**

The American Promise: A History of the United States, Volume II: from 1865 by James Roark, et al; Any version of the book is acceptable except the 8<sup>th</sup> edition—full version, concise or value. Any format of the book is fine — digital, hard copy, loose-leaf, etc. You may purchase the book from any source.

## **Required Skills and Technologies:**

You must have reliable internet access to complete the requirements for this course. You are expected to answer emails within 72 hours, attend class, upload documents in an appropriate format, take online quizzes covering your chapters and civic literacy, analyze Supreme Court cases, conduct internet research, and properly cite sources of information.

#### **Instructional Methods:**

This class is primarily taught through lecture and class discussion and assessed with tests, outlines and assignments. Lectures and PowerPoints are available in Content. You will complete chapter and civic literacy quizzes online, complete and upload homework assignments in the Dropbox, analyze a landmark Supreme Court case and upload to the Dropbox, and watch videos/listen to podcasts and summarize your findings to the discussion board. You will also have opportunities for asynchronous debate in bi-weekly chats. All assignments can be found in Content.

### **Class Attendance and Tardy Policy:**

Daily points are assigned to encourage participation and attendance. Students are expected to be punctual. Tardiness is disruptive to the instructor and the students. Points will be deducted from the daily points grade if a student is tardy or leaves class early. Participation points will be deducted if a student chooses to use his/her cell phone during class, if a student is participating in non-class activities on his/her laptop or disrupts the learning environment with his/her behavior. Violators will lose daily participation points and may be asked to leave the classroom for the remainder of that day. Failure to attend will initiate the student's removal from class. You will be withdrawn as a no show if I have not had contact with you by Friday of the first week at noon. ### **Course Requirements:**

You are expected to read the syllabus carefully and contact me if you have any questions. It is your responsibility and is to your benefit. You must have reliable internet access and be familiar with Brightspace. All arrangements must be made in advance unless there is an emergency. Quizzes will be reopened during the last two weeks of class if a make-up is allowed. Assignments must be submitted to the Dropbox or Discussion Board no later than 11:59PM on the day they are due. Late assignments will result in a zero unless arrangements are made in advance for special circumstances. A late dropbox is provided but you are not guaranteed to have the assignment count unless you have made advance arrangements. At the end of the semester, one assignment from the late dropbox will be evaluated for a grade (minus 10% for being late). This does not apply to a situation arranged in advance. It is entirely your responsibility to ensure that your assignments are uploaded successfully. If you are having any difficulties uploading the assignment, it is your responsibility to notify me immediately and email the assignment. All Dropbox assignments are due by 11:59PM on the designated date and must be submitted in an appropriate format (information is provided under the Help icon in our Brightspace page). It is your responsibility to check your Brightspace email at least every other day and to respond to email sent by me. The option to withdraw from the course is the sole responsibility of the student.

### **Grading:**

**Introductory Materials:** 50 possible points. You will be required to respond to an email sent by the instructor, complete a short introductory assignment and submit it to the Dropbox, and take an introductory quiz.

Chapter Quizzes (Multiple Choice Format Online) 15 Tests – 50 possible points per test. Each quiz has 25 questions/2 points each. It is the responsibility of the student to contact the instructor prior to the scheduled quiz time if you will be unable to complete the quiz by the deadline. You are allowed to use your textbook and materials, but you may not work with another student or utilize outside online resources. You will have two attempts on each chapter quiz and the highest score will be entered as the grade. The quizzes are randomized so you may have different questions on your second attempt. Any student caught cheating will receive an F for the quiz and will be reported to the Dean of Student Services for further disciplinary action. Make-up quizzes will rarely be granted and only for extraordinary circumstances; plan on taking the quiz by the scheduled deadline.

Homework Assignments: 15 Assignments – 20 possible points per assignment. Homework assignments must be submitted to the Dropbox before the deadline. The homework assignments are short answer questions covering the material from your textbook and are posted in the content area of Brightspace. No late assignments will be accepted unless prior arrangements are made. A late dropbox is provided but you are not guaranteed to have the assignment count unless you have made advance arrangements. At the end of the semester, one assignment from the dropbox will be evaluated for a grade (minus 10% for being late). This does not apply to a situation arranged in advance. It is your responsibility to check that the assignment uploaded properly. They must be in a format that is supported by D2L Brightspace. You may submit in Word, Notepad, rtf or pdf format. If your work is handwritten, take a photo and submit it as a jpeg. Brightspace does not support Works. If you are unable to submit the assignment to the Dropbox, email it to me immediately to show that the work was completed by the deadline. The homework assignments are weighted equally and there is an assignment for each chapter. Homework assignments are to be completed on your own and you should not share your work with other students. Do not request that another student share their work with you. Do not take material directly from your textbook without using proper citation or cut-and-paste from online sources. All outside sources require proper citation. Any student caught cheating will receive an F for the assignment and will be reported to the Dean of Student Services for further disciplinary action.

**Class Participation:** You will receive up to 10 points daily for being on time, remaining for the entire class, and participating in discussions. If you arrive late, it is your responsibility to verify that you were marked present for the class.

**Civic Literacy:** 5 Assignments – 40 possible points per assignment. You will complete a quiz for each Unit covering civic literacy and Landmark Supreme Court cases. You will also complete one Supreme Court Analysis.

**Face to face Course Attendance:** Students are expected to abide by College policy as stated in the College Handbook. Daily points are assigned to encourage participation and attendance. Students are expected to be punctual. Tardiness is disruptive to the instructor and the students. Students are not at liberty to leave during class unless they are ill. Points will be deducted from the daily points grade if a student is tardy or leaves class early. Participation points will be deducted if a student chooses to get his/her cell phone out during class, if a student is participating in

non-class activities on his/her lap top, or disrupts the learning environment will his/her behavior. Violators will lose daily participation points and may be asked to leave the classroom for the remainder of the class meeting.

Be aware that students may be withdrawn by the instructor at mid-term for lack of academic progress. Make every effort to communicate with your instructor if you are not participating in the class or if you have an overall/cumulative D or F grade.

#### **Medical Illness:**
