Course Description

This course is a survey of the history of the United States from its earliest colonial beginnings to 1877. The course surveys the major social, economic, cultural, and political developments of the American people up through the Civil War and Reconstruction. Emphasis is placed upon the individuals and events that have shaped these developments. (G.E.) (TR)

Course Outcomes

- 4. Evaluate the weaknesses of the Articles of the Confederation and how they were addressed in the Constitution.
- 5. Analyze the impact of the Industrial Revolution.
- 6. Describe the various reform movements that arose during the antebellum period and evaluate their effectiveness.
- 7. Evaluate the impact of slavery on both whites and blacks in the South.

- 8. Evaluate the factors that led to the Civil War.
- 9. Assess the American Civil War in terms of costs, tactics, strategies, and outcomes.
- 10. Students will develop and demonstrate an understanding of the basic principles and practices of American democracy and how they are applied in our republican form of government.
- 11. Students will develop and demonstrate an understanding of the United States Constitution and its application.
- 12. Students will develop and demonstrate knowledge of the founding documents and how they have shaped the nature and functions of our institutions of self-governance.
- 13. Students will develop and demonstrate an understanding of landmark Supreme Court cases, landmark legislation, and landmark executive actions and their impact on law and society.

Course Requirements

You are expected to read the syllabus carefully and contact me if you have any questions. It is your responsibility and is to your benefit. Choosing to remain in this course demonstrates that you agree to the conditions outlined in the syllabus. This is a hybrid course, and you are expected to utilize Brightspace extensively. You must have reliable internet access and be familiar with Brightspace. You may complete tutorials at southflorida.edu/current-students/distance-learning/brightspacetutorials. If you will be unable to complete an online guiz or assignment by the deadline, notify me in advance. All arrangements must be made in advance unless there is an emergency. Quizzes will be reopened during the last two weeks of class if a make-up is allowed. Assignments must be submitted to the Dropbox or Discussion Board no later than 11:59 PM on the day they are due. Late assignments will result in a zero unless arrangements are made in advance for special circumstances, or it is the one late assignment accepted through the late work Dropbox. At the end of the semester, one assignment from the late work Dropbox will be evaluated for a grade. This does not apply to a situation arranged in advance. It is entirely your responsibility to ensure that your assignments are uploaded successfully. If you are having any difficulties uploading the assignment, it is your responsibility to notify me immediately and email the assignment. All Dropbox assignments are due by 11:59 PM on the designated date and must be submitted in an appropriate format (information is provided under the Help icon on our Brightspace page). It is your responsibility to check your Brightspace email at least every other day and to respond to emails sent by me. The option to withdraw from the course is the sole responsibility of the student.

Assignments

Introductory Materials: 5% of total grade. You will be required to respond to an email sent by the instructor, complete a short introductory assignment and submit it to the Dropbox, and take an introductory quiz.

Chapter Quizzes: (Multiple Choice Format Online) 15 Quizzes 45% of total grade – 40 possible points per quiz. Each quiz has 20 questions/2 points each. It is the responsibility of the student to contact the instructor before the scheduled quiz time if you will be unable to complete the quiz by the deadline. You are allowed to use your textbook and materials, but you may not work with another student or utilize outside online resources. You will have two attempts on each chapter quiz and the highest score will be entered as the grade. The quizzes are randomized so you may have different questions on your second attempt. Any student caught cheating will receive an F for the quiz and will be reported to the Dean of Student Services for further disciplinary action. Only one quiz will be reopened during the semester, plan on taking the quiz by the scheduled deadline.

Homework Assignments: 15 Assignments 30 % of total grade – 20 possible points per assignment. Homework assignments must be submitted to the Dropbox before the deadline. The homework assignments are short answer questions covering the material from your textbook and are posted in the content area of Brightspace. No late assignments will be accepted unless prior arrangements are made. A late Dropbox is provided but you are not guaranteed to have the assignment count unless you have made advance arrangements. At the end of the semester, one assignment from the late dropbox will be evaluated for a grade (minus 10% for being late). This does not apply to a situation arranged in advance. It is your responsibility to check that the assignment is uploaded properly. They must be in a format that is supported by D2L Brightspace. You may submit in Word, Notepad, rtf, or PDF format. If your work is handwritten, take a photo and submit it as a jpeg. Brightspace does not support Works. If you are unable to submit the assignment to the Dropbox, email it to me immediately to show that the work was completed by the deadline. The homework assignments are weighted equally and there is an assignment for each chapter. Homework assignments are to be completed on your own and you should not share your work with other students. Do not request that another student share their work with you. Do not take material directly from your textbook without using proper citations or cut-and-paste from online sources. All outside sources require proper citation. Any student caught cheating will receive an F for the assignment and will be reported to the Dean of Student Services for further disciplinary action.

Civic Literacy: 5 Assignments 20% of total grade – 40 possible points per assignment. You will complete a quiz for each Unit covering civic literacy and Landmark Supreme Court cases. You will also complete one Supreme Court Analysis.
